# BEE SPECIMEN COLLECTORS

#### CARL BENSON

J.C. BEQUAERT: Joesph Bequaert was a Belgian entomologist who ended up in the US after many world travels and retired in Arizona. He worked on everything from snails to parasitic flies to ticks.

G.D. BUTLER: George (Bugsy) Butler was UA faculty in the 1950's and early 60's before going to USDA and working for Cotton Inc. in Phoenix.

D.S. CHANDLER: Former UA Graduate student who studied with F.G. Werner and now is a beetle expert at University of New Hampshire.

R.H. CRANDALL: Former UA student

**ERIC ERICKSON:** Worked at Carl Hayden Bee Lab, eventually becoming director.

PAUL GERHARDT: Extension Entomologist in Maricopa County for the Entomology Department.

M.L. LINDSEY: President of Global Organics Group Bioflora in Goodyear AZ who did his Masters at the UofA. Although he works in Integrated Pest Management, he collects insects to learn about them. MacLACHLAN: Former UA Grad student

## A.A.NICHOL

MARTHA NOLLER: Curatorial Assistant at UAIC to F. G. Werner before Carl Olson was hired who did much collecting. She had to retire early due to blindness.

#### Z. NOON

W.L. NUTTING: Termite expert, UA Faculty, close friend and colleague of F.G. Werner. He died in 1992.

CARL A. OLSON: Associate Curator of UAIC since 1975 who has participated in many surveys over the years.

STEVE PRCHAL: Founder and director of SASI and a former Desert Museum small animals keeper. He is a respected photographer and display maker who now lives in Costa Rica on the Osa Peninsula, working on butterfly farming

R.B. ROBERTS: Radclyffe B. Roberts was an associate professor of entomology at Rutgers University. He died in 1988.

**KILIAN ROEVER:** Former UA student who now lives in Northern Arizona as a pesticides salesman and insect collector.

**DON TUTTLE:** Extension entomolgist for UA stationed in Yuma who began in 1950-51. He was most interested in spider mites but was a general collector.

### M. WARGO

FLOYD G. WERNER: Hired in 1953, he was charged with learning the insects of Arizona. He collected in Southern Arizona extensively and was the main architect of the UAIC. He retired in 1989 and died 1992. Werner was a specialist in *Meloidae* & *Anthicidae* (2 families of beetles) but knew much about the insect world in general. After WWII Werner stayed in the Philippines for a year and collected for the Field Museum in Chicago.
